DEMILITARIZED ZONE EDUCATION AND ORIENTATION PROGRAMS

FOR THE COMMANDER:

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Summary. This regulation supersedes United Nations Command Policy Letter 2005-02 Demilitarized Zone (DMZ) Education Program. It outlines the general responsibilities required to ensure compliance with the terms of the 27 July 1953 Armistice Agreement with regard to personnel authorized to enter the Demilitarized Zone (DMZ) as part of the authorized Republic of Korea Army (ROKA) DMZ Education Programs.

Summary of Change. This document is completely new. A full review of its contents is required.

Applicability. This regulation is applicable to all ROKA units authorized to maintain DMZ Education and Orientation Program (E&OP) sites and all military and civilian personnel who enter the DMZ to visit Republic of Korea Army (ROKA) Education and Orientation Program (E&OP).

Supplementation. Issue of further supplements to this regulation by subordinate commands is prohibited unless prior approval is obtained from United Nations Command Military Armistice Commission (UNCMAC) Secretariat, Unit #15294, APO AP 96205-5294.

Records Management. Records created as a result of processes prescribed by this regulation must be identified, maintained, and disposed of according to AR 25-400-2. Record titles and descriptions are available on the Army Records Information Management System (ARIMS) at <https://www.arims.army.mil>.

Suggested Improvements. The proponent of this regulation is the UNCMAC Secretariat. Users are invited to send comments and suggested improvements on DA Form 2028 (Recommended Changes to Publications and Blank Forms) to UNCMAC Secretariat, Unit #15294, APO AP 96205-5294.

Distribution. Electronic Media Only (EMO).

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Chapter 1 Introduction

1-1. Purpose

This regulation prescribes responsibilities and procedures for the operation of Republic of Korea Army (ROKA) Education and Orientation Program (E&OP) sites in the Demilitarized Zone (DMZ) authorized by the United Nations Command (UNC) Commander. DMZ E&O programs in the United Nations Command Military Armistice Commission Headquarters Area (UNCMACHA) to include the Truce Village at Panmunjom, and the Swiss/Swedish Neutral Nations Supervisory Commission (NNSC) Camp are approved and managed by the United Nations Command Military Armistice Commission (UNCMAC) and are governed by UNC Regulation 551-5.

1-3. Explanation of Abbreviations

Abbreviations used in this regulation are explained in the glossary.

Chapter 2 Responsibilities

2-1. UNC Commander (UNC CDR)

The UNC CDR, as signatory of the Armistice Agreement (AA), has exclusive responsibility to carry out provisions of the AA in Korea (south of the Military Demarcation Line, MDL). The UNC CDR has designated UNC Deputy Chief of Staff as the sole authority for approving exceptions to this regulation. The UNC CDR is the approval authority for the certification of all ROKA E&OP sites within the DMZ.

2-2. UNC Deputy Chief of Staff (DCS)

The UNC CDR has delegated oversight authority of the DMZ E&OP to the UNC DCS.

2-3. UNCMAC Secretary (SEC)

The UNCMAC SEC provides the UNC component of the Military Armistice Commission (MAC) with all administrative support to include regulatory control over all access to the southern portion of the DMZ. The UNCMAC SEC has supervisory responsibility over the ROKA E&OP:

a. Establishing maximum and daily capacities unique to each ROKA E&OP site. Maximum capacity is the upper limit of the number of people that can be present at a ROKA E&OP site at any one time. Daily capacity is the upper limit of the number of people that may visit a site during the course of any one day.

b. Periodically reviewing all policies concerning the operation of ROKA E&OP sites.

c. Directing changes to operating procedures, when warranted.

The UNCMAC SEC is the approval authority for non-standard ROKA E&OP site visit requests that are not in compliance with the provisions of this regulation.

2-4. Republic of Korea Advisory Group to the UNCMAC (ROKAG)

ROKAG is responsible for liaising with the UNCMAC Secretariat on all ROK government-sponsored E&OP activities. The ROKAG is responsible for:

- a. Ensuring that all ROKA infantry divisions that are authorized to operate E&OP sites are aware of the applicable provisions of this regulation and UNC Regulation 551-4.
- b. Ensuring that ROKA infantry divisions operating E&OP sites understand their responsibility to provide for the security of all visitors to these areas.
- c. Collecting and consolidating E&OP information from ROKA infantry divisions operating E&OP sites within the DMZ and reporting this information on a monthly basis to the UNCMAC Secretariat IAW the sample at appendixes B and figure B-1.
- d. Advising ROKA infantry division commanders on the correct procedures for requesting certification of new E&OP sites within the DMZ, IAW the sample at appendixes C and figure C-1.

2-5. UNC Public Affairs Office (PAO)

- a. Receive requests for media personnel to access ROKA E&OP sites, and forward requests with recommended action to the UNCMAC Secretariat 14 days prior to the requested access date.
- b. Ensure appropriate and trained ROKA PAO escorts assigned to any media group accessing the DMZ. The escort will be a commissioned officer or civilian of equivalent grade; PAO will provide 1 escort for every 10 media personnel (11-20 media will require 2 PAO escorts, 21-30 media will require 3 PAO escorts, etc.); exceptions to this must be specifically approved by the UNCMAC SEC or the SEC's designated approval authority.
- c. Ensure units understand media personnel accessing the DMZ must wear the designated arm band. These arm bands will be provided by the ROK PAO escorts.
- d. Ensure the number of media personnel within the DMZ at any given time will not exceed 100 personnel.
- e. For media requests submitted less than 14 days prior to the requested date, UNC PAO will coordinate directly with the UNCMAC SEC or SEC's designated approval authority. Short notice media operations will be allowed when in the best interest of the UNC mission and if UNC or ROKA PAO staff are available to support.

2-6. ROKA Infantry Division CDRs Operating DMZ E&OP Sites

- a. Ensure compliance with the Armistice Agreement within the DMZ and exercise responsibility and authority over E&OP site access approvals and operations. The access approval authority shall not be delegated to subordinate units.
- b. Provide security and positive control for all visitors to the E&OP site.
 - (1) Tour groups must have an escort at the E&OP site, and this responsibility cannot be delegated to vendors or any third party entities.
 - (2) Appropriate measures must be employed to prevent visitors from leaving the confines of the designated E&OP sites.

(3) Although outside operators, such as county offices and tour companies, may be authorized to sell tickets, arrange tours, and arrange transportation; procedures must be in place to ensure that vendors do not exceed ticket sales beyond the maximum or daily capacities of E&OP site.

(4) Provisions must be made to provide basic medical assistance to site visitors and have in place an approved medical evacuation plan.

c. Ensure all visitors entering the DMZ are briefed on security and safety issues, and the importance of following all instructions from security personnel and escorts that may be assigned to aid in the administration of E&OP sites.

d. Ensure all media requests are submitted to the UNC PAO office. UNC PAO will then forward the media requests to the UNCMAC Secretariat for approval. Ensure approved media visiting the DMZ E&OP sites are accompanied by a UNC PAO certified escort, and that media are identified in accordance with the UNC Regulation 551-4.

e. Ensure visitors use motorized transportation to and from E&OP Sites unless specifically authorized by UNCMAC to do otherwise. Each site must not exceed the authorized maximum capacity for buses and cars.

f. Employ necessary administrative processes to ensure accurate accountability of visitors to E&OP sites and ensure all briefs and information presented to visitors is relevant to E&OP site.

g. Provide sufficient shelter and escorts for visitors at the E&OP sites to accommodate the authorized maximum capacity, in case of an emergency.

h. Report to the UNCMAC Secretariat, via ROKAG, any interruption of E&OP operations due to degraded security situations. The report should outline the security concern and the action taken by the division. Report is to be submitted no later than three hours after security concern is identified.

i. Ensure access to E&OP sites for activities other than orientations are submitted and approved by the UNCMAC SEC as per UNC Regulation 551-4. This includes any maintenance, renovation, or construction at E&OP sites.

j. Be prepared for periodic inspections by UNCMAC led teams to validate compliance with the AA, this regulation and UNC Regulation 551-4.

k. Develop primary and alternate evacuation plans and exercise periodically.

l. Submit monthly E&OP site reports, by the 10th of each month, through ROKAG to UNCMAC of the following information for the previous month:

(1) Regular visitor count of personnel and vehicles by day and site.

(2) Distinguished visitor count by name, title, date, and site.

(3) Civilian agencies visitor count by day and site.

(4) Press agencies visitor count by day, personnel and vehicle count, site and UNC PAO contact information.

- (5) Tour companies and civilian vendors operating E&OP sites.
- m. Notify the UNC CDR through UNCMAC not later than 24 hours prior to a E&OP site visit by a significant Distinguished Visitor (DV). Personnel considered a significant DV are listed below:
 - (1) A general/flag officer not assigned to the infantry division.
 - (2) Provincial governor or person elected to national office.
 - (3) Appointees to ROK national government or foreign national governments.
- n. Establish memorandums with local agencies administering programs or facilities within designated E&OP sites, as required. Provide UNCMAC with current agreements with any external agencies, relating to the administration of the programs or facilities.
- o. Every six months, provide UNCMAC and ROKAG with updated points of contact and identify primary and alternate means of communication.

Chapter 3 Policies

3-1. Policy

- a. It is UNC policy to encourage visits to the DMZ consistent with scheduling availability, security/safety considerations, and operational commitments. Positive efforts will be made to accommodate all personnel desiring to visit the DMZ E&OP sites, subject to procedures contained in this regulation and those prescribed by the UNC CDR.
- b. If a ROKA infantry division fails to maintain compliance in accordance with this regulation and UNC regulation 551-4, the offending E&OP site will be de-certified. In order to re-establish operations, a new site request must be submitted to UNCMAC, through the ROKAG for CDR approval.

3-2. Access Procedures

- a. Access to E&OP sites in the DMZ shall be administered and controlled by the local unit commanders.
 - (1) Self-escort procedures must be approved by the UNCMAC.
 - (2) Self-escort of visitors to and from E&OP sites is acceptable, however, access routes must be clearly marked and barriers must be in place to prevent access to unauthorized areas.
- b. Visible signage must be posted to include but not limited to: identifying restrictive access roads, landmine areas, southern boundary lines, and the general outpost (GOP) fence line.

3-3. Restrictions for E&OP Site Visitors

- a. Visitors to the DMZ are not allowed to carry weapons without UNCMAC SEC written approval. This prohibition includes DV Personal Security Detachments. Doing so would constitute

an Armistice Agreement violation. Any requests for exceptions to this policy must be sent to the UNCMAC SEC through the ROKAG.

b. All orientation visitors will carry personal photo identification (ID) while visiting the E&OP site (e.g., ID card, citizenship card, passport, or student ID card, etc.).

c. All visitors must remain within the confines of the established E&OP site. ROKA infantry divisions that would like to allow DVs access to areas beyond the confines of designated E&OP sites must submit an access request for the additional areas to UNCMAC SEC through ROKAG per UNC Regulation 551-4.

d. All visitors to the DMZ E&OP sites must display a neat and presentable appearance and detailed dress requirements are determined by the local commanders. General UNCMAC guidelines are as follows:

(1) External military personnel must either wear their respective service dress uniform (Class A or B equivalent) or appropriate civilian attire.

(2) Civilian personnel must be appropriately dressed in casual, semi-formal or formal attire. This includes a dress suit, khakis or jean trousers with a Polo-style or formal collared shirt. Shoes must be closed-toe and can be either low quarters or boots.

(3) The following civilian attire and accessories are strictly prohibited within the DMZ:

- (a) Shirts/tops without sleeves or which expose the midriff.
- (b) Any clothing with insulting, profane, provocative or demeaning representations.
- (c) Ripped jeans or trousers which expose undergarments or private parts of the anatomy.
- (d) Shorts or skirts that are above the knee in length.
- (e) Outer articles of clothing that are sheer or stretch material such as warm-ups pants and leggings.
- (f) Sports uniforms, logos or athletic clothing of any kind.
- (g) Shower shoes, sandals or opened-toe shoes.
- (h) Clothing with military-style camouflage to include hunting apparel.
- (i) Oversized clothing or excessively baggy trousers.
- (j) Leather "biker" vests and leather riding chaps.

e. Given the significance of the E&OP and the conditions for operations, the minimum age of guests allowed to be on tours is recommended as 10 years, but details are determined by the local commander.

f. Photography is permitted, if approved by the unit commander.

g. No special events are to be held at any of the E&OP sites without the written approval of the UNCMAC SEC.

**Chapter 4
New DMZ Education and Orientation Sites Requests in the DMZ**

a. The UNC CDR retains authority to approve the establishment of additional DMZ E&OP sites.

b. Currently, there are 11 E&OP sites being operated by ROKA Divisions.

c. Local unit commanders who desire to establish a new DMZ E&O site will submit a request through ROKAG to the UNCMAC Secretariat for UNC CDR consideration.

d. See appendixes C and figure C-1 to fill out the request for a new DMZ E&OP site.

e. After UNC CDR approves the operation of a new DMZ E&O site, the construction of related facilities, such as a new E&OP center, shall be executed in accordance with the procedures prescribed in the UNC Regulation 551-4.

**Chapter 5
Areas of Operation**

a. Military Demarcation Line (MDL) and DMZ: The Korean Armistice Agreement (AA) signed on 27 July 1953 established the Military Demarcation Line spanning the width of the Korean peninsula and separating the two forces (UNC on the south side and the KPA on the north) who were in conflict. It also stipulated each side would withdraw two kilometers from the MDL and remove all military personnel, weapons, obstacles and defensive architecture from their respective side creating a 4 kilometer wide by 241 kilometer long Demilitarized Zone. No one can enter the DMZ or cross the MDL without the express approval of the Military Armistice Commission.




Figure 5-1. OP Dora-1ID




Figure 5-2. Tunnel #3-1ID




Figure 5-3. OP Sang-seung-25ID




Figure 5-4. OP Tae-poong-28ID




Figure 5-5. OP Yul-se-5ID




Figure 5-6. Tunnel #2-6ID




Figure 5-7. OP Seung-ri-15ID




Figure 5-8. OP Chil-sung-7ID




Figure 5-9. Tunnel #4-2ID




Figure 5-10. OP Ulchi-12ID




Figure 5-11. OP Keumgang-22ID

SUBJECT: Request to Establish UNC OP 799 for DMZ Education and Orientation Program (E&OP) Site

1. OP 799 – “Pil-Sung”
 - a. (U-R) CH 399144.
 - b. (U-R) Propose to establish an E&OP site within the DMZ to educate and orient visitors to the Armistice and security situation in Korea and to build a visitors’ center (see attached blueprint).
 - c. (U-R) Evacuation Plan: Primary plan -- visitors will be escorted by unit escort (3x Soldiers) to nearby personnel shelter, which can hold up to 250x visitors at grid CH3999814568. Alternate Plan -- visitors will be escorted to the civilian control line (CCL) at grid CH3999714558, and then onward to a park in nearby “named” village (see attached picture). Will exercise primary and alternate evacuation plans every 6 months.
 - d. (U-R) The unit will escort visitors between the CCL and E&OP site. Two unit Soldiers will brief each group at the E&OP site. There is an nearby tunnel that can shelter up to 250 visitors.
 - e. (U-R) Hyundai Tours, See Seoul Rides.
 - f. (U-R) Maximum Capacity: 100x pax, Daily Capacity: 250x pax.
 - g. (U-R) 3x Soldiers will confirm visitors’ names, 1x escort vehicle will escort to E&OP site, and 2x Soldiers at E&OP site to provide briefings and escort visitors around the confines of the E&OP site.
 - h. (U-R) 1x Medic will be on standby at the Command Post, which is 2 minutes from E&OP site.
